**Minutes** of the meeting held on Saturday 25 June 2016 at 2pm at Congress House, 23/28 Great Russell Street, London WC1B 3LS.

Mr N R N Gooch was in the chair and Messrs R Jack, J Stone and D Tanner were in attendance.

Apologies were received from Messrs D Davies and B Lucas.

As a novelty the chairman showed a magnifying tool called a Phonoscope which can be attached to the camera function of either an iPad or an iPhone to produce a 60x image.

As a new acquisition Jeremy Stone showed a cut out from a parcel card showing definitives from the reign of Muhammed Ali Shah.

The minutes of the meeting held on 19 March 2016 were approved by the meeting. There were no matters arising.

The chairman reported that he had attended the World Stamp Show in New York where the Study Circle had manned a booth and held a meeting followed by an informal dinner. All these activities had enabled members to meet one another with much lively discussion.

The editor of the bulletin advised the meeting that currently he had articles for future publication but would always be pleased to receive further contributions.

Jeremy Stone reported that he had been unable to hire a society table at the Association of Sussex Philatelic Societies convention in the Autumn, to assist in publicising the activities of the Study Circle, as all space had been sold to previous buyers. David Tanner offered to investigate availability at UK Westpex in Spring 2017.

All members present contributed to a display of airmails from the period 1923 to 1930 with a selection of both mint and used stamps and postal history.

The chairman closed the meeting at about 4-00pm and thanked the members for their attendance. He indicated that the next meeting would be held on 3 September 2016 in Congleton to give members the opportunity to display "Postmarks of Interest."

## The 2 Kr Ahmed Shah inverted centre, by Salman Qureshi

Mr Salman Qureshi has provided this example of Persiphila 679a the 1924-25 Ahmed Shah Qajar 2 Kr with inverted centre (with RPS Certificate). Persiphila describes this stamp as "among one of the most fascinating errors of Iranian philately".



New Double Overprint: Bushire Under British Occupation Error from 1915 by Ghiam Yamin



The British occupied Bushire in 1915 and assumed control of the local postal affairs from August 8, 1915 to October 16, 2015. During this period, the British overprinted Ahmad Shah definitive stamps from 1911 and coronation stamps from 1915 with the overprint 'BUSHIRE / Under British / Occupation.' Herein is the discovery of a new double overprint error on a used copy of the 3 ch value of the Ahmad Shah portrait issue, Scott No. N3 (Fig. 1). The main overprint is from Setting Ib, Pos. 1 and the second overprint is not clear but comes from a different setting (which is possible), both appear genuine. The authenticity of this stamp has been corroborated by the American Philatelic Society (APS). As far as I know, this is the only double overprint of its kind for this value. Another double overprint error on a used copy of the 6 ch value of the Ahmad Shah portrait issue, Scott No. N5 was recently sold by Argyll-Etkin in 2015.

# The 1921 Coup d'Etat Issue, by Mehdi Esmaili

Mr Esmaili has provided the following document (in French, followed by a translation in English) which gives interesting details as to the destruction of the "Coronation surcharges of 21 February 1921".

#### Report.

In putting into effect the decision No.

9324 of 1st Agrab, 1301 the Council of Ministers for orders the destruction of stocks of the commemorative stamps of the coronation surcharges 21 February 1921 with the exception of a certain number of sets to be given to Mr Assadollah Khan Kurdistani and to be sent to the International Bureau at Berne, the following operations are to be carried out by the General Direction of Posts in the presence of S. Ex. Vahid ol Molk Minister of Posts and Telegraphs, S. Ex. Hakim ol Molk, Mr Gray, Mr Assadollah Khan Kurdistani and Mr Pire, Manager of the General Directorate of Posts:

1st Open the envelope containing the cachet surcharge. This envelope is to be imprinted with the seals of S. Ex Mokbered Dowleh, ex Under Secretary of State for Posts and Telegraphs and of Mr C. Molitor, ex- Director General of Posts. S. Ex. Mokbered Dowleh will assist in the operation and M.C. Molitor will send word of its procurement (perhaps completion?).

2nd Holding back 300 sets of stamp surcharges 21 fevrier 1921 for M. Assadollah Khan Kurdistani and preservation of 413 sets intended for despatch to the

International Bureau at Berne overprinted with the cachet specimen.

3rd Destruction by fire of the surcharged stamps remaining, values and quantities as follows:

4th Placing all but (used/worn?) cachets in use of the surcharge: See (opposite/annexed/on the other side) one impression of the cachet intact and one impression of the cachet rendered useless.



As can be seen, 300 sets were retained for Mr A. Kurdistani, and a further 413 sets were retained for forwarding to the UPU with Specimen overprints. The remainder were destroyed by fire and the overprint "cachet" defaced.

Six days later, the following document (again in French, followed by an English translation) shows that in addition to the mint sets noted above, Mr Kurdistani was "given" a total of 84 stamps of this issue used on barnemels.

# Book Review, by Sassan Pejhan

#### Old Postcards from Iran

Ghassem Safi 215 pages

Printed by Gostaresh-e Honar Publication Company, 1989

First printing: 5000

Persian Title: كارت پستالهاى تاريخى ايران

The book starts with a section that provides an overview (6 pages) of postcards in general. The author states that there are no Persian language sources on the history of postcards. He then references several Persian and foreign language dictionaries which merely provide a description of what a postcard is. After that, he provides a translation (in summary form) of articles on postcards in three different encyclopaedias: *Larousse*, *Brittanica* and the Italian *Dizionario Enciclopedia*.

This section is followed by one that is about postcards in Iran (4 pages). Little information is provided, however. Based on the printings on several postcards themselves, the author has identified five institutions that sold PPCs (all in Tehran):

- Seyed Abdolrahim Kashani
- Moussa Javaher
- Now-Bahar store in Lalezar
- Golestan, also in Lalezar
- Seyed Abass Kashani and brothers

The rest of this section includes general statements to the effect that PPCs are historical documents which chronicle the daily lives of people and showcase the important events and personalities of the era, as well as the artistic skills of the designers.

The main body of the book consists of seven sections of black and white pictures (with the exception noted below) of privately printed PPCs (with no text or explanations) and arranged as follows:

- The Elite رجال
- Historical sites, scenery and cities of Iran آثار تاریخی، مناظر و شهرهای ایران
- The look of old Tehran سیمای تهران قدیم
- Living style and faces of the people زیست و سیمای مردم
- Scenes from the Constitutional Revolution صحنه هایی از انقلاب مشروطه
- Elite Constitutional Revolution scenery رجال مشروطه مناظر
- Sample Greeting cards and examples of postcard vendors' seals

The first section depicts 50 pictures of mostly Constitutional Revolution era personalities (from both sides of that revolution) as well as Qajar nobility. Of note is picture No. 35 which depicts William Morgan Shuster, the American civil servant who served as the Treasurer general for six months in 1911.

Section two includes 47 pictures of historical buildings (including mosques and Persepolis ruins) and general city views and sceneries.

Section three contains 45 photographs of various streets and monuments in Tehran and its vicinities.

My personal favorite is the one depicting the house of Moayer-ol-Mamaalek. Due to the poor quality of the pictures in the book (see later), I have pasted a picture of that house which I retrieved from the Internet:



The fourth section includes a total of 52 photographs, showing people of all walks of life (schools, dervishes, etc.)

Section five shows 35 pictures related to the Constitutional Revolution. These mainly depict militias, armies and battle scenes, as well as hangings and pictures of the opening of parliament.

The sixth section is the only one showing color photographs (16 total) of PPCs.

The seventh and last section includes 11 photographs of various greeting cards (including both Nowrooz and Christmas).

These sections are followed by two indexes:

- Index of Postcards
- Index of Names of places, people and subjects

The book should really be seen as a semi-organized photo-album of the author's postcard collection. There is unfortunately no real research involved or much in the way of deltiological information. Having said that, the book probably is the first one on the topic of Picture Postcards in the Persian language and the first to include a, relatively speaking, large collection of these cards. It is also a reminder that there is, to this day, no well-researched written source of information on Iranian privately printed postcards.

The quality of the printing is poor and a reflection of the realities in Iran in 1989: the eight year war with Iraq had just ended and the country was still suffering from a decade of revolution, war, sanctions and war-time rationing of, among many things, paper and print products.

## Early First Flights-Not the usual suspects! by Robert Jack

Some first flight covers are seen quite frequently, others less so. Illustrated on the following pages are some covers from 1929-30 which are less often seen.

4th April, 1929. First Flight **Bouchir-Karachi**. A stage of the first commercial Imperial Airways London-Karachi flight. This stage was flown by the De Havilland Hercules "City of Jerusalem" which arrived in Karachi at 7pm on the 6th April, 1929.

Bouchir (Depart) 4. IV. 29 to Karachi 6 APR 29 9-PM.


Also cachets as follows-

two line POSTE AERIENNE (bilingual);

three line BOUCHIR AVION PREMIER DEPECHE ANGLETERRE – INDES; and

four line Premier Vol Bouchir – Karachi (bilingual)

Air stamps 5 ch x 3, postage stamps 1 kr + 15 ch

The dealer's advert shown above was found inside this cover. Unfortunately it is not dated, but as it is in pre-decimal currency it must be pre-February 1971. It gives an idea as to how such covers were priced then – this one was £1 (= approx US 1.30)!


14th January, 1930. First Flight Lingeh–Delhi.

Receiving Delhi cancellation on reverse: 18 JAN 30

Also with a two line cachet: LINGEH Ouverture Service Aerien

On the reverse of the cover can be seen a pencil annotation "27 flown". No figure is given either by the IPSC or Persiphila catalogues: does anyone know whether this figure is correct or where it comes from?





2nd February, 1930. First Flight Jask–Jodhpur.

Djask 2 II 30 to Jodhpur 3 FEB 30

By Imperial Airways. Typescript inscription: Premier Post Aèrienne DJASK – JODHPUR; also green FISRT FLIGHT cachet.

Again there is an annotation on the reverse "about 60 flown". Does anyone know where this figure comes from?





4th February, 1930. First Flight Karachi–Bushire–Teheran.

An incoming first flight cover this time-
